

How to Prepare Recyclables for Curbside Collection

Curbside pickup of paper and "commingled" items (glass, plastic, aluminum and tin) occurs every other week. See the annual Township Planner calendar and the recycling section of www.livingstonnj.org for your neighborhood's pick up schedule.

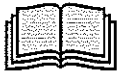
Mixed Paper:

Paper items may be mixed and placed in sturdy bags or tied with string in bundles not weighing more than 30 lbs. and more than 1 ft. in height. Plastic bags are not acceptable. Paper placed in plastic bags cannot be collected.

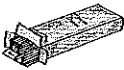

* Items **NOT** accepted for recycling with paper items include burnt or sun burnt paper, wax coated corrugated cardboard boxes, toy boxes with a plastic window or plastic strapping. Styrofoam in any form should be recycled with commingled.

* Items **NOT** accepted for recycling with commingled items include mirrors, window or auto glass, light bulbs, ceramics, any paper products, wire "coat" hangers (wire of any kind), electrical equipment, dishes, and appliances.

Commingled: Glass, Aluminum, Steel, Tin, Plastics and Styrofoam



Rinse food and beverage containers. Place in a sturdy reusable container such as a bucket, crate or can equipped with drainage holes. Containers cannot be larger than 20 gallons or 50 lbs. Flatten plastic containers to save space. Commingled materials set out in bags cannot be collected.

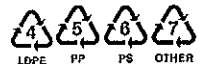
